The Consummate Work-Study Student

On the surface, Onesiphorus Muthoka hasn't changed much.

The giant smile and friendly demeanor, to which customers in the Penn Yan P&C grew accustomed, are ever present. So, too, is his accent, a tip-off that his roots are elsewhere.

However, Muthoka has changed. That large smile is even larger these days after he received a Bachelor of Science degree in management from Keuka College at the 99th commencement May 27.

He earned his degree in just three-and-a-half years, a noteworthy accomplishment in itself, but even more remarkable when you consider that in addition to being a full-time student, Muthoka was full-time Keuka employee and worked at the P&C Saturdays from 4 to 8 p.m.

Muthoka moved to Penn Yan from Mombasa, Kenya, in 2001 with his cousin, who landed a teaching position at Keuka College. Muthoka joined the College's housekeeping staff and three years later joined the student body.

"I don't know how I got all of my work done, I just did," said Muthoka, whose spring 2007 semester consisted of class from 9:05 a.m. to 2:25 p.m. and work from 2:30 p.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Muthoka completed his homework and studying during breaks between classes, one hour before

bed each night, Saturday mornings and afternoons (before reporting to work at P&C), and Sundays after church in Rochester, where he is a youth leader.

And he doesn't plan on resting anytime soon. Muthoka will begin Keuka's Master of Science in management program this fall. His ultimate goal is to earn a Ph.D.

Muthoka completed 21 credits his final semester at Keuka, but the rest of the time he took the traditional 15 credits per semester. He doesn't have one favorite class, but sees them all as "equal" when it comes time to apply his class work to his career.

"They are all dimes in my pocket," said Muthoka.

And, Muthoka completed four Field Periods—month-long internships—in those three-and-a-half years, too: at Five Star Bank, in management at P&C, in New Orleans helping with relief efforts after Hurricane Katrina, and in marketing at the College.

While the other three all "related to his field," the Field Period in New Orleans gave him the greatest sense of "community."

"To see all of these people without homes, without a place to sleep, when I had a place to sleep... I wanted to help."

Yates County Sheriff's Office Has Substation on Campus

Keuka College is in the business of education while crime prevention is a key focus of the Yates County Sheriff's Office (YCSO).

With an eye toward preventing crime through education, the two local entities have teamed up.

The College provides a substation for the YCSO within the Office of Protective Services in the Dahlstrom Student Center.

"Keuka College is within the Sheriff's Office Zone 2 Patrol Area," said Yates County Sheriff Ron Spike. "This substation is in place for deputies to stop and work on reports, confer with both protective services and residence life staff and, on occasion, accompany security officers on rounds throughout campus, including residence halls."

"The College and sheriff's office plan to work collaboratively to raise awareness of such issues as personal safety and the dan-

gers of alcohol and other drug use through continuing education programs," said Dean of Students Jim Blackburn.

This isn't the first time the College and sheriff's office have teamed up. Keuka criminal justice and criminology majors regularly conduct Field Period internships with YCSO.

The Donald, Arnold, MJ and... Keuka

Aben Gallery Features Works by Renowned Artist Yankel Ginzburg

What does Keuka College have in common with Herman Wouk, Donald Trump, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Barbara Streisand, and Michael Jordan?

All own works by world-renowned artist Yankel Ginzburg.

More than 30 lithographic prints and acrylic paintings by Ginzburg are on display in the College's Robert S. and Rebecca Bannan Aben Gallery located in the Lightner Library. Many of the works were donated by the Abens, who were honored, along with Ginzburg, at the official opening of the gallery May 27.

Earlier that day, Ginzburg received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree at Keuka College's 99th commencement.

"My mother always wanted me to become a doctor and today I have," said Ginzburg.

In presenting Ginzburg for the degree, Donald Wertman, a member of the Keuka College Board of Trustees, called Ginzburg "a leading contemporary artist whose work has received worldwide acclaim and whose lifetime achievements are as diverse and impressive as his art."

Ginzburg was born in Kazakhstan and immigrated to Israel. He was the first Israeli artist to exhibit in Cairo, Egypt, and is a respected authority on Middle East politics. Ginzburg has been called on to discuss the peace process with such world leaders as Golda Meir, Richard Nixon, Anwar Sadat, Menachem Begin, Jimmy Carter, Boris Yeltsin, and Bill Clinton.

A generous philanthropist and advocate of charitable causes, he has raised millions of dollars to help the needy in Russia, Cambodia, and other countries. He helped establish the Fund for Democracy and Development in 1991, was nominated for the Horatio Alger Award in 1992 and, that same year, was honored by President Boris Yeltsin and the Supreme Soviet of the Russian Federation with the Humanitarian Honor First Class.

In addition to the Ginzburg works, the Aben Gallery features a bronze bust of Ginzburg created by



Professor of Art Dexter Benedict. A renowned sculptor, Benedict has received a number of large-scale commissions and his talents are displayed throughout New York state. In addition, his sculpture and drawings have been featured in numerous solo exhibitions and group shows at regional galleries.

"This gallery will be the third eye in the heads of Keuka students; they will see things in ways they have never seen them before," said Ginzburg, who hopes the gallery will inspire future painters and sculptors.

Wertman said Keuka College is honored to host Ginzburg's "energetic, multi-talented genius" in the Aben Gallery, which will "enhance the cultural climate of the campus and surrounding region."

Earn a BSW ASAP

Keuka College's Accelerated Studies for Adults Program (ASAP) now offers a bachelor of science degree in social work (BSW).

The program is designed for adults "currently working in human service-related agencies and agencies looking to professionalize their work force," said Gail Roberts, associate professor of social work and director of the program.

The College's baccalaureate social work program has been accredited by the Commission on Social Work Education (CSWE) since 1972. Every eight years, the program undergoes reaccreditation review. The most recent review and reaffirmed accreditation took place in 2004.

Earning a bachelor's or master's degree from an accredited social work program is required of social workers seeking licensure from the National Association of Social Workers.

The accelerated BSW "is the same [as the one offered in the traditional program] in all major respects," said Roberts. "Same program, same accreditation."

One difference is format.

"The students go through the program as a cohort and take one class each week for five weeks," said Roberts. "Students can expect to earn their degrees in about two years."

The program is offered at Hillside Children's Center in Varick and another

cohort is scheduled to begin in August at Monroe Community College's Damon City Campus in downtown Rochester. Other sites are planned.

"We're really excited to offer the program to those in the human services community in the region," said Roberts. "It's a way to give back to those doing this kind of work by assisting them in getting their degrees."

BSW graduates are qualified to work in a variety of employment settings including: children and adolescents, chemical dependencies, criminal justice, counseling, family services, gerontology, hospice, health care, policy, and government, to name a few.

In addition to social work, ASAP offers bachelor's degrees in organizational management, criminal justice systems, and nursing. It offers master's degrees in criminal justice administration and management, as well as a certificate in gerontology.

The bachelor's degree completion programs are designed for students 25-years-old and above with 60 hours of college credit. The master's degree programs are designed for adult students who hold a bachelor's degree.

The renovation of the ground and first floors is complete. The Office of Communications and the Division of Finance/

Business are located on the ground floor while the first floor is home to the Office of Alumni and Family Relations, Office of Development, Office of Grants Administration, Office of Admissions, and Office of Financial Aid.

The new-look lobby (first floor), that will eventually feature a Wall of Donors, was nearing completion at press time. Also targeted for summer work: the three residence floors, front entrance, lakeside entrance, and cupola.

The College is also closing in on *The Campaign to Save Ball Hall* goal of \$10 million, having raised \$8.9 million (plus a \$600,000 Kresge Foundation challenge grant).

Local Players Key to NCAA Bids

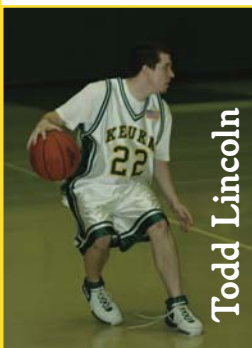
The Keuka College women's softball team won a school-record 25 games (25-6) and earned a first-ever bid to the NCAA Tournament in 2007.

Two Bath residents played key roles in the team's success:

- Marianne Wallace won 12 games on the hill while finishing with a 1.56 ERA and striking out 104 batters in 112 innings of work. The senior was named NEAC Pitcher of the Year, was an All-NEAC first team selection, and was named the MVP of the NEAC Tournament. Wallace also pitched a complete game (10 innings) shutout win over Elms College in the NCAA Tournament.

- Amanda McConnell led the Storm's bats with a team-leading .394 batting average, 39 hits, 32 runs scored, and 3 triples. McConnell was also named to the All-NEAC first team.

The women's basketball program also garnered a first-ever NCAA Tourney bid, receiving a huge boost from junior power forward and Ovid product Abby Brewer. She started all 26 games and finished second on the team in rebounding at 6.8 per game and fourth in scoring at 6.9 per game.

Wallace, McConnell, and Brewer weren't the only local standouts to have an impact on Keuka College sports in 2006-

07. Here are some others:

Men's basketball standout Todd Lincoln (Watkins Glen) led Keuka to a 13-13 mark while becoming the all-time leader in assists (473) and fourth all-time leading scorer

(1,186). The senior was named to the All-NEAC first team after scoring 14 points and dishing off 5.9 assists per game. Lincoln's classmate, Steve Willson (Bellona), also played a huge role for the men's basketball team, finishing second on the team in scoring at 13.8 points per game while leading the Storm in rebounding (7.0). Willson was an honorable mention All-NEAC selection.

On the soccer field, junior sensation

Nicole Bondellio (Watkins Glen) continued her dominance while leading the Storm with 13 goals, 7 assists, and 33 points. Bondellio, an All-NEAC first team selection for the third straight year, is already the school's all-time assists leader (31) and will most likely become the all-time leader in goals and total points during her senior season.

Stanley product Matt Palmer helped guide the men's tennis team to a 4-3 record while winning flight No. 2 in singles at the NEAC Tournament, earning him All-NEAC first team honors. Palmer finished 3-2 in singles and 6-2 in doubles.

A number of men's lacrosse players from the area helped lead the Storm to a 7-5 record. Senior Ryan Burton (Seneca Falls), who finished third in the nation in scoring (5.45 per game), set a Keuka College single season record by netting 60 points (40 goals and 20 assists). Burton was also third in the nation in goals per game (3.64). Penn Yan's Derek Christensen helped the Storm finish 10th nationally in man-down defense (0.848) while manning the defensive side of the field.
